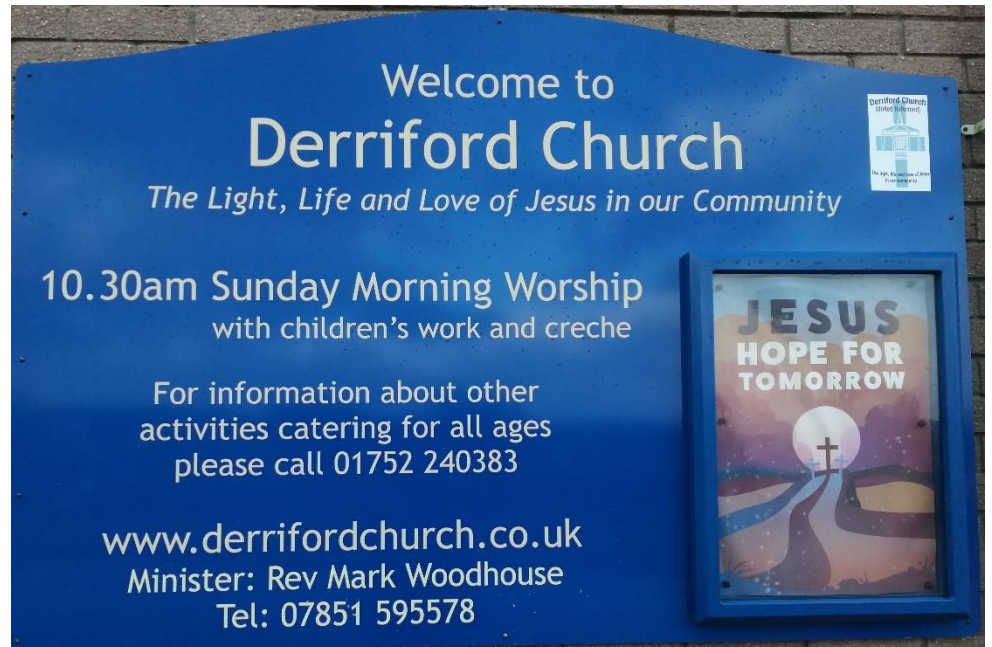

# Caleb – Faithful Warrior

## Joshua 14:6-15

Caleb was born into slavery, in Egypt. His father may have been a gentile, Caleb means dog and was used as a derogatory term!

He was an adult at the time of the twelve plagues and so went through the first Passover, with the blood of a real lamb painted on the door of his house.

He left Egypt with the rest of the Israelites under Moses' leadership, growing in faith and faithfulness, and by the time they reached the borders of Canaan, he was of such standing that he was viewed as one of the leaders of the tribe of Judah, such that he was chosen as one of the twelve to spy out the land and bring back a report.

He was with Joshua and they gave a positive and encouraging report being sure that God would keep his promise and deliver the land into the Israelites hands, of course we know that is not what happened, and he spent the next 40 years wandering in the desert with an unfaithful people, while he remained wholeheartedly faithful to God.

Our story is similar to Caleb's, born into slavery to sin and in a foreign land – we too are redeemed by the blood of a lamb, God's lamb, his son, Jesus.

We then journey through the world, which is always set against us, working to keep faith in our wonderful God and to know him above all.

Then the day came when it was time for the promise to be fulfilled, God promised Caleb the land where his foot had stepped as a reward for his wholehearted faith in Jehovah and as he moved in to take possession of the promise, we too often have to fight to take possession of the things that God has promised us. Caleb never lost his trust, we need to make sure that we never lose our trust, that when we take those risks that God calls us to make, we trust that he will come through for us.

There are four actions we need to be engaging in:

- 1 Be fully yielded to God.
- 2 Know and believe God's promises.
- 3 Be willing to step out in faith.
- 4 Depend on God at every turn.

It worked for Caleb; it will work for us!

### Sunday Morning Worship

As I indicated at the start of this newsletter our theme for this year which each of our preachers will focus on is 'Get excited about the Bible'. So, over the months ahead they will share their favourite Bible stories from both the Old and New Testament with the hope that they get us all 'fired up to read and engage with the Bible and in doing that help us all to grow in our walk with the Lord Jesus Christ. I am very very excited about it. Reading and understanding the Bible is not always easy and it is really helpful to have some resource alongside. So here are a few books etc that were recommended at the end of the service on the 7<sup>th</sup>:

**Unlocking the Bible - David Pawson.** This is a very readable and helpful textbook to the Bible as a whole. David Pawson is my favourite Bible teacher who sadly – although not for him, died last year. If you are a Kindle user you can currently buy this for £2 (otherwise it is about £12.99)

**David Suchet's Bible.** Reading the Bible is often difficult, especially with its very unusual names and places which are often hard to pronounce. One way to help with that is to have the Bible read to you and who better to read it than David Suchet (who plays Agatha Christie's Poirot on TV) and who is a wonderful Christian.

**You Version Bible.** Also, the You Version which, if you have a smart phone, you can download for free. It has numerous Bible versions available, with many having audio option so they can be read aloud as you read the text.

**God on Mute – Peter Greig.** This is not particularly about the Bible. But is a very helpful book, especially if we are going through tough times. Also by Pete Greig is Red Moon Rising and How to Pray both are very helpful in our walk with Jesus (in fact I would go as far as to say Pete's books are always worth reading and also easy to read and very entertaining too). Also if you do have a smart phone it may be worth downloading Pete Greig's *Lectio365*. Daily devotions for the 24/7 prayer movement.

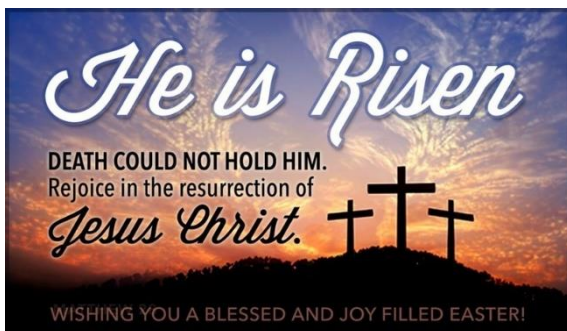

As always may I encourage you to read it before the service, and if you can why not read the whole of Amos? It's a great book.

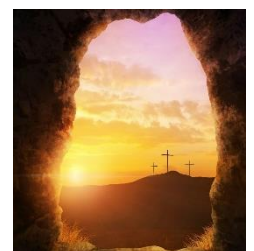
## Our Easter Services...

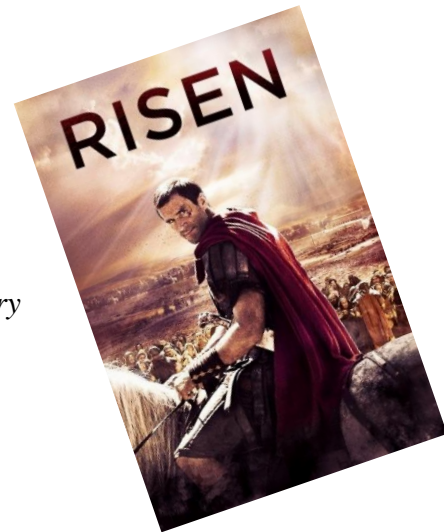

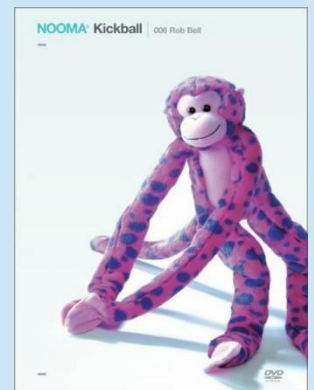
## Nooma.

## **Church and Church Hall**

We have no real details about the ideas for the buildings, as most of you know we've had the quinquennial, and especially with respect to the Hall, it was as feared and indicated that there is a major amount of work to be done. We must put some serious prayer into the way forward. We are currently obtaining information about costs of the work and rebuilding etc. Please be assured though, that no work will be agreed to without sharing the ideas / options with the whole church and agreeing a way forward. We will almost certainly have a church meeting at some time as soon as we are able to re-open without restrictions. This will be a long-term plan one that I am sure will be on our agenda for a number of years. In the meantime as we receive costings and other information we will share that with the fellowship either through the newsletter or through church services (or both).

May I ask us all to keep this high up in our prayer life and if you receive any, words of wisdom, visions or ideas from the Lord please share them and let me have them. It is so important through all of this that we hear God together as a fellowship. Please remember our tagline **Psalm 127:1-2:**

**Unless the Lord builds the house, the builders labour in vain.  
Unless the Lord watches over the city, the guards stand watch in vain.**

## **Focus on the Fellowship.**

For the next couple weeks, we have Mary's story for our Focus on the Fellowship. Bless you Mary.

My life began in Alexandra Nursing Home on the June 5th, 1935. I went to live with mum and dad in St. Levan Road in a flat. Dad was told to register my name as Doreen Elizabeth, but when he got home my mum was horrified as he had changed the name to Laura Mary! My mum refused to call me Laura and used only my second name Mary! That is why you all know me as Mary.

We moved to the top of Moor Lane in 1938, just before my brothers were born. I was sent to stay with my Aunt Edie in Edith Street St. Budeaux while my mum was indisposed, being spoilt with tea and biscuits in bed with Aunty Nora (who became Nora Hallie and mother of David Hallie lay preacher who some of you may remember living at the end of Upland Drive in later years).

I started School in September 1939 as the war started. I hated school because we had to carry our Gas masks and do air raid drill in the underground shelter. I was sent to Brixham every holiday to ease the burden on my mum. She would put me on the bus in the bus station in charge of the conductor and Gran would meet me in Paignton and then take me to Brixham.

I used to black lead the stove and clean the brass and when I got a little older, I was made to paint the kitchen chairs. One day as I was standing on her front doorsteps there was a daylight raid, no siren, and a German plane flew over the rooftops of the houses opposite, which were on a level with our steps trying to sneak out to sea unnoticed, he was machine gunning us as he went but missed. I could see his goggles he was so near! Another school holiday mum took us shopping in the square leaving one brother with Aunty Edie. We were on our way home when there was a raid, without warning mum threw us on the ground and laid on top of us by the library as he was machine gunning, no one was hit but they dropped an oil bomb. We clapped for joy because we thought the school had been hit by the amount of dust that went up, but it had dropped on the fields between Weston Mill and Bridwell Road!

When I was 7 years old dad who was in the navy had a shore base for a major refit, usually he was away for 3 years at a time; he took us all over to Belfast with him where the refit was taking place, it saved my life as I had lost half my weight in a fortnight, the doctor asked my mum what she had done to me! TB was thought to be the cause, but x-rays showed it not to be the case. It was thought that I was grieving over the raids as we had to sleep in the shelters every night for the previous 2 years. We also had war damage to the bungalow ending with a firebomb landing in the rafters over my bed, the ceilings over my bed were missing among others. We were then called back from Brixham for the war damage people to come and repair the house. As I was carried to the shelter from mum's bed, I saw her diving between little pockets of fire burning in the lounge to get some clothes from the airing cupboard. I was the last one to be carried down to our Anderson, mum had taken one brother, the other would jump from his cot and run down on his own. A good neighbour at the rear of our garden with only grown-up children had taken the fencing down to give mum a hand for all the raids. When we were not in the shelters, the year in Belfast, we only had 2 raids and we never left our beds.

Mum used to bring my brothers to pick me up from school at first, until they also went, and on our way home, she would buy some rock buns for us but one day there were only 2 left, she gave me one and broke the other in half for my brothers, Michael screamed at the top of his voice I don't want a broken rotten bun I want a mended rotten bun. Everyone was looking as if he was being murdered. We curled up laughing our heads off. Another time memory: the other brother shouted, 'I don't want cabbage dumplings.' when mum bought some sprouts.

We came home after the year, as dad went back to sea returning sometime later for another spell for damage repairs, but only stayed 3 months, where I was in bed all the time with yellow jaundice. I was allowed to have a puppy and kittens on my bed in the lodgings we were in this time, having been unable to rent a house. When I left Victoria Road School in 1945 having passed the scholarship I went to Stoke Damerel School, I still hated school as the school dinners were awful. One day a pupil and I were caught swapping ingredients and then things got worse as I was stood over to eat diced tinned beetroot. I needed a glass of water to get each mouthful down. When I had got so far I was told ok I could go and get my dessert but I couldn't and went out to the loos and was violently sick. I have not been able to look at beetroot ever since.

I left school at 15, one year early as I couldn't get to grips with trigonometry, I had lost almost all my second year due to breaking my left knee, which was in plaster for 3 months and told the only sports I could do was swimming and cycling, at twelve years old having sprained my ankles 7 times in the year before breaking my knee and not having a bike left me with only swimming, so in the summer months I went to Mount Wise every day with a friend buying buns on the way home, the baker used to tell us who could have the extra one as he always gave us a baker's dozen (13)
