

Amos

Prophet and Intercessor.

The Old Testament book of Amos is often considered to be full of doom and gloom with threats from an angry God followed by death and destruction. In fact, it is the epic tale of an ordinary man called by God to serve God's plans to save the very soul of Israel. Amos steps up as a Prophet who speaks God's message to Israel and thus upsets a lot of those who heard him. However, we must note here that Amos also steps into the role of an intercessor for Israel.

Prophecy is not necessarily a prediction of the future but rather the invitation to work with God to shape the future according to God's intentions.

I wonder how Amos felt moving from working as a sheepherder and keeper of fig trees to be a Prophet and Intercessor for the nation of Israel? Frankly, I would have been scared! How about you? Yet Amos, no matter how scared he may have been, went and did it. What courage! "When God reveals through a prophet that He is about to judge an individual, church or nation, is there any point to asking God to change His mind and show mercy? Yes! Amos models the power of one person's empowered prayers to stall God's judgement.

Sometimes God acts unilaterally. But, more often God links His next move, in part, on our prayers. Often, heaven and earth (God and people) are linked together in a symbiotic relationship to bring God's plans into reality.

God's method all through the Bible in advancing His Kingdom and dealing with crisis is to call ordinary people, anoint them with His Spirit, equip them, and then send them out as His co-workers into the situation. Depending on the crisis it could be a Prophet like Amos, a warrior like Joshua, a King like David, or an Intercessor like Moses to name a few. God's intervention in the apostasy taking place in Israel which was rapidly culminating in national catastrophe was to send Amos as Prophet and Intercessor.

Dear friends of Derriford church, shall we look to speak God's Word and Truth into the lives of the community as His prophetic people and to intercede for those who live here that they may encounter Jesus and know Him as Saviour? Co-operating with God and each other we have the opportunity and privilege of speaking and praying God's plans into reality.

Thank you, Chris, Great stuff, bless you. You know folks please remember our wonderful preachers. They dedicate massive amounts of time listening to God and preparing sermons and organising services for us. If you get the opportunity, please say thank you to them.


I do hope you are able to come and join us it is always a very blessed time. The title this week is:


HOPE TO SEE YOU THERE! The plan is that we watch the film and afterward have a chat over coffee about the film and anything that is on your mind!

Church and Church Hall

Further update on our hall. We are currently looking at various options around the idea of whether it would be better to pull the building down and start again, rebuilding it in such a way that it will be even more of a resource to be used both for church and as a community centre or repairing what is already there. Costs will be one factor that will play into the final decision in all of this. Of course,





once we have more information of possible plans, we will share them with all the fellowship and look to agree the best way forward.

Whichever way we decide to go, it is clear that our hall will not be available for a considerable time. I suspect even with the quickest option it will be way over a year. Remember whatever we do we have to raise the money before we even start to do the work.

With this in mind, it means that we have very little flexible space to use for church or for the community. To help us with this we plan to remove the pews (they will initially be stored in the hall). We will then be able to use the sanctuary space in a more flexible way. This is something, as we all know, which has been planned for a while now. Initially we will need to use the chairs that we currently have, but we also plan to ask the URC for a grant to help us buy new church chairs.

Further to this, the council have asked if they can use our church for the elections in May, which we have done (albeit in the hall) for many years. We have said yes, and they have agreed to send strong men and women to come and move the pews into the hall for us. God is good. We think this will be done over the next couple weeks (before Easter)

May I ask us all to keep this in our prayers and if you receive any, words of wisdom, visions or ideas from the Lord please let me have them. It is so important through all of this that we hear God together as a fellowship. Please remember our tagline **Psalm 127:1-2:**

Unless the Lord builds the house, the builders labour in vain. Unless the Lord watches over the city, the guards stand watch in vain.

Focus on the Fellowship.

Here is Mary's second instalment. Thank you again Mary:

When I left school, my mum had got me a job at the sub post office on the square, behind the counter, I lasted 10 months there having met a girl from school who went to the GPO as a telephonist, which was a job I had always wanted ,but as I had got a job to go to the head mistress wouldn't let me attend the interviews. My mum was mad and told me to go and find out why, she said she wouldn't bother with me because I had the sub post office job! God opened the way for me. I had given my heart to Jesus when Billy Graham came to our church in 1950, the year I left school, before he set out on his campaigns. I was baptized a year later and became a Sunday teacher of 5-

year-olds and YFC chairman eventually after some help from my baptism sponsor and her husband who became a Baptist minister in London later.

I met Brian on a blind date in 1952 arranged by a work friend and her boyfriend, at the speedway. When we got there, I was very nervous and had been sick all day, He just asked me to turn around so he could use my back for his scoring cards. Then he took me home on the bus, though he thought I was engaged, he asked me for another date. We had a long courtship as he had to do national service,



he used to come to St Budeaux on Sundays but went to Embankment Road for recreation having to attend church every so often. We were married at St Budeaux church in 1957 after Brian had come home one weekend and got baptized. He had been corresponding with our minister and his padre on camp. As our minister was satisfied, he baptised him at the evening service. His mum came but his dad walked up and down outside and wouldn't come in. We were married there in 1957, honeymooning in London, for a week and then lived in a flat owned by an uncle in Beatrice Ave, St Judes. We were both able to walk to work. However, the following February I was made redundant, we had voted for only 95 % pay but the majority wanted 100%. so it

resulted in women being redundant for the men to be dominant; don't know how to put the results properly. Brian started searching for higher paid work, and ending up with a job in Bishops Stortford, which had a tied house with it. Then we had Stephen in January 1960.a very traumatic birth as the cord was around his neck 3 times, but a very good midwife, after telling me to work harder amidst bells and buzzers going off, in this little cottage hospital, she cut the cord before he was delivered to save his life, he was very blue, needed pumps etc to get him breathing. Then in the Bishops Stortford big hospital Alison was born in 1961. More trauma afterwards as I had retained after birth, which was putrefying and I almost died, being taken back into hospital. Thanks to modern antibiotics all went well.

We then managed to buy our own house the other side of town close to the end of Stanstead runway, an end of terrace house. We took in lodgers to help pay the mortgage, then we lost two girls. We had only been in the house for 18 months by then but the doctor thought a change would be good for me but that meant a move to Cheltenham which was better by far, another new estate, with lovely neighbours. We looked for a Baptist church again as we had had good support at Bishops Stortford; the minister had forwarded our details etc to Cheltenham, but it was in the centre of town and buses were not conducive to us getting there as we still had no transport. Brian had not passed his driving test and he had to have more lessons and money was short and so this was slow. We found a congregational church we could walk to across a farm lane called Warden Hill. We were given a warm welcome, so we stayed there. The children going into Sunday school during service like here. Then with a lot of medical help I was able to have two more children, Janice in 1966 and Mark in 1968. It was a difficult time but we enjoyed our stay there. We joined the IOF which we got into the social side of, although we had to work at this but started making friends all over the country giving us opportunity to travel even to other countries when we could afford it, travelling with friends gave us courage to go abroad.

Thank you again Mary, really great stuff. We will have the final part of Mary's story next week.
