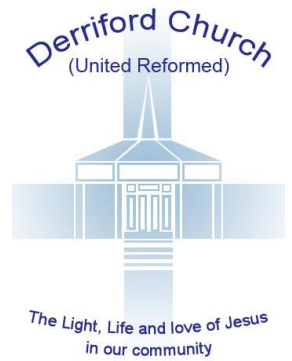
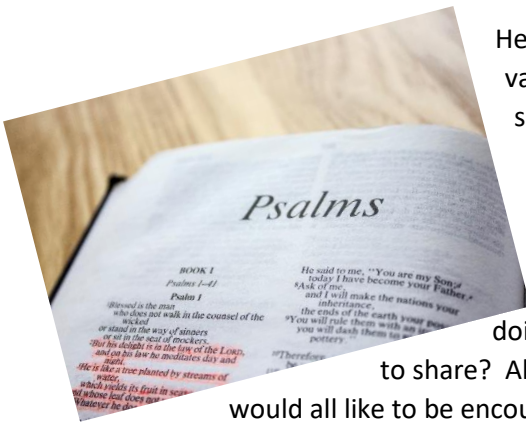

Summary of Sunday's Sermon/Service

Elijah's Persistent Prayer

An Australian town had experienced a hard drought and there was a special prayer meeting to pray for rain. The church building was packed, but the minister told them to go back home - no one had come expecting to have their prayers answered... THERE WASN'T AN UMBRELLA IN SIGHT! This story illustrates that there is very often a big difference between what we say about prayer and what we actually believe about prayer.

The book of James contains a lot of teaching about prayer. He states that one of the reasons we don't receive what we desire is we don't pray. He tells us that if we lack wisdom, we should pray (James 1:5); if we are suffering, we should pray (5:13); if we are sick, we should call for the elders to anoint us with oil and pray for us (5:14); we should confess our sins one to another?" (5:16)

If we believe that prayers have such power, do we pray as often as we should? It is common for many of us to feel we don't know how to pray or what to say – and James understood that, so he gave us an example of how we can pray. He referred to the example of Elijah's prayer in 1 Kings 18:41-46.

The King of Israel was a man named Ahab, and he was married to a Philistine woman named Jezebel.



Jezebel had a reputation for wickedness, and partly because of her influence, Ahab and the nation of Israel had fallen into a kind of "hybrid paganism." They apparently still prayed to Yahweh, but they also worshipped some wicked pagan gods: Baal and Asherah. God punished Israel with a drought and Elijah challenged the prophets of Baal to see whose God would bring rain. Of course, Elijah prevailed, and he then went to the top of Mount Carmel to pray to the Lord as James described.

What can we learn from Elijah's prayer that makes it such a good example for us?

1. Prayer that works takes work! Elijah prays bowed down with his head between his knees. This must have been an extremely uncomfortable way to pray. I believe that Elijah was using this painful posture to help himself focus on the prayer at hand. This reminds us to remain focused on what we are praying for.
2. Prayer that works takes persistence! Notice how many times Elijah prays. He prays 7 times. He kept going with the same prayer until he saw an answer. Elijah kept praying in full faith that God would hear. It may be a good idea that we start keeping a 'Prayer Journal' so that we can remember our conversations with God.
3. Prayer that works takes risks! Elijah was explicitly asking for rain. Use requests that we can measure. Not only did Elijah ask for rain, but he let everyone around him know he was expecting rain. He told his servant to look for rain. Even more than that—he told wicked King Ahab to get ready for it.
4. Prayer that works takes understanding of God's will! God wanted to send rain on Israel. That's why Elijah had come back. To ask for something "in Jesus' name" means you are asking God for something you believe He would want to do. It is asking for those things that will honour Him, that are in accordance with His will
5. Prayer that works takes righteousness with God! On our own, our righteousness is like filthy rags (Isaiah 64:6), but Jesus died on the cross so that we could receive His righteousness. The great exchange is that Jesus takes all our sin and gives us all our righteousness. This is why James said, 'The prayer of a righteous person has great power as it is working'. Because we aren't operating under our own power, we aren't working for our own reputation. And we aren't relying on our own righteousness.

DL Moody, in his book *Prevailing Prayer*, quoted Bishop Joseph Hall, "*It is not the arithmetic of our prayers, how many they are; nor the rhetoric of our prayers, how eloquent they be; nor the geometry of our prayers, how long they be; nor the music of our prayers, how sweet our voice may be; nor the method of our prayers, how orderly they may be; nor even the theology of our prayers, how good the doctrine may be - which God cares for. Fervency of spirit is that which avails much.*"

Through his persistent prayer, Elijah was able to give final proof that God is in control by ending the drought. As Ahab raced his chariot home to escape the approaching storm, Elijah, in the strength of God, ran before him. Just imagine what we can achieve in God's strength...

“Lord, transform, revive and heal our land”.


What a great Prayer! The song title is: We Seek Your Kingdom, and you can find it on Youtube:

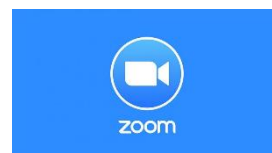
