#### John 21:1-24

#### **Encouragement**

I am sure that we are all in need of encouragement at times. Good words are worth much and cost little and to give a word of encouragement is to be like our Lord Jesus. Encouragement is to inspire with a word of hope, courage, or confidence. In the New Testament, six out of seven uses of the verb 'take courage' comes from the mouth of Jesus.



Everyone can become discouraged over situations or lack courage to take on a responsibility or face a daunting task. You might be pondering whether to try something new. In these troubling times, perhaps you are facing the threat of unemployment and you fear the future. Or perhaps you are facing the agonies of bereavement, where although the death may be some way in the past now, the sense of insecurity and loss is catching up with you and

you are feeling alone. For older people you maybe on the verge of being housebound and feeling increasingly isolated and marginalised from what is happening in the community. Perhaps there are others who feel unwell. Something is wrong with your body. Tests have been carried out and you are anxiously awaiting the results. Situations like these take us from the security of what was to the insecurity of the unknown. The future holds a question mark. Fortunately, we have a loving Lord who, having given His all for us, is committed to our need and wants to encouragement us. Jesus is the same yesterday, today and forever! This is how God gives us courage or encouragement:

**Encouragement of Scripture:** This is our most important and fundamental source of encouragement as it is God's special and authoritative revelation to us of both Himself and His plan of salvation in Christ.

**Encouragement of the Holy Spirit:** The Holy Spirit in Greek is translated as the Counsellor, Comforter, or Intercessor. It is our spiritual enabler that is vital within our overall encouragement.

# Encouragement from members of the body of Christ: In 1 Corinthians 12, Paul portrays both the unity and diversity of the Church as an organic body made up of individual parts all designed to work together in a caring and functional way.

John 21 teaches us how Jesus encourages His followers. Verses 1-4 highlight how we may look in the wrong direction when we are discouraged. Peter and the others were impatient for their Lord to appear. They began to look back on the good old days and Peter declared that he was going out to fish and they went with him. Peter was ready to give up and revert to what he knew best – fishing!

Or via the phone: 0203 901 7895 /id 83803659404 He wanted to be in his comfort zone. Looking back though highlights what happens if our orientation is in the wrong direction – they caught nothing! Read Philippians 3:13-14 – keep your eyes focused on the job that God is calling us to do. Verses 15-17 highlight challenges of what is behind our motivation of what we do – is our passion based on God's kind of love? Jesus is asking Peter 'how much do you love me?' Peter eventually realises that there is nothing he can do without Jesus and it is at that point that Jesus declared him fit enough for ministry. Servanthood is so important. Verses 18-22 explain that we should not compare ourselves to others using Peter and John as examples.

God is calling us to be encouragers or courage builders helping people to experience the sufficiency of Jesus our Saviour and to persevere in the race with our eyes firmly fixed on the finishing line regardless of the obstacles that obscure us. Some people have to be helped across the finish line. Some have stumbled over their own feet; others have been tripped by family members and so-called friends. We must help those who have fallen into the snares of the devil; we must lift up the fallen, bind up their wounds, and help them on their journey toward home.

Here are a few questions we can consider further:

- 1. Read 1 Corinthians 12 what does this passage teach us about spiritual gifts and their application?
- 2. What has God used most to encourage you in your walk with Him?
- 3. How can you be an encouragement to others?
  - a. Fellow believers
  - b. Friends & family
  - c. Local community

#### **Easter Services.**


'Hallelujah He is risen, He is risen indeed, hallelujah'.

**Good Friday Service** (2<sup>nd</sup> April 2:00pm) in the Carpark.


Easter Sunday Service (4th April 10:30am) in Church.

As I was the first person to write about my life last year I only used 200 words as I thought this was the limit. So Mark has kindly allowed me to have another slot in the newsletter.

I was born in Maidstone, Kent and lived in a what was then a little village with my parents and two younger sisters. Although we didn't have many material things my childhood was a happy one and as the sun shone nearly every day I spent many hours outside! I attended a small village Primary School and then went to the Grammar School. I left at 16 years old and went straight to work for Kent County Council in the finance department. This was my only job and I stayed there for 9 years.



I attended our local church which was Church of England from a very young age and later helped in Sunday School. Wherever I have lived I have found a Church nearby and the children came with me to services. In Plymouth they both went to Pilots and Youth Club although neither of them regularly attend a church now.

A friend that I made on my first day at secondary school arranged for a blind date with Pete and the rest is history! (Pete does wonder why he is still talking to these friends!). We were married in 1973 and our daughter, Anne-Marie, was born in 1976 followed in 1979 by our son Daryl.

As I said previously we moved to Plymouth in 1976 when Pete was promoted and the post was in Devonport. I won't pretend I was happy to move away from all my family and it took me quite a



while to feel settled but now I don't want to live anywhere else. As a stay at home Mum I knitted jumpers for a shop in Tavistock and helped at two playgroups. Once the children were at school I worked as a meal time assistant at their primary school. In 1988 I started work at the Schools Library Centre which served all the schools in West Devon with books for their libraries and topic work. It was a job that I absolutely loved and I also did shifts in several local libraries. I retired in 2012 and have been even busier since!

I am fortunate to still have both my parents who are in their nineties. Sadly they divorced over 40 years ago but I was lucky to have had a lovely Step-Dad and Step-Mum. We are proud Grandparents to Madelaine who is 17, Oscar, 14 and Theo 8, and Evie 5.
